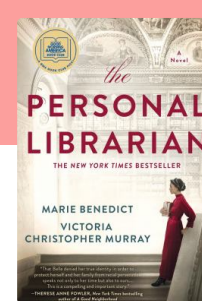
The Henna Artist

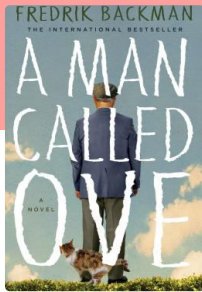

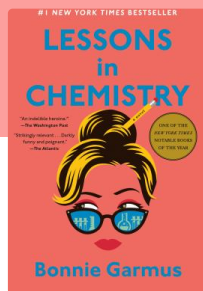
