


The Woman They Could Not Silence By Kate Moore 2nd Floor, PSYCHOLOGY / MENTAL HEALTH / MOO




Becoming By Michelle Obama 2nd Floor, BIOGRAPHIES


The Feather Thief By Kirk W. Johnson 2nd Floor, TRUE CRIME / THEFT / JOH


Killers of the Flower Moon By Brit Bennett 2nd Floor, TRUE CRIME / MURDER / GRA

Along the way, Orlean reveals how libraries provide much more than just books—and that they are needed now more than ever.




Devil in the White City By Erik Larson 2nd Floor, TRUE CRIME / MURDER / SERIAL / LAR
